# **Dog Grooming Tools Guide**

### Proper Use, Function, and What to Buy for Professional Results

# **Grooming Scissors (Shears)**

### **Types & Uses**

- 1. **Straight Shears** For trimming clean lines and shaping around the body.
- 2. **Curved Shears** For following the natural contours of the dog, especially around the legs, head, and ribcage.
- 3. **Thinning Shears** For blending and softening lines, and reducing bulk in thick coats without leaving chop marks.
- 4. **Chunkers** A hybrid of straight and thinning shears, used for texturizing and finishing fluffy coats, like Doodles or Aussies.

#### **Usage Tips**

- Always comb the coat out before cutting.
- Keep your scissors sharp and oiled.
- Use curved shears in a "scooping" motion when shaping round areas.

### **Shopping Tips**

- Japanese stainless steel is high quality and long-lasting.
- Ergonomic handles reduce wrist strain.
- Look for a tension adjustment screw.

# **Combs & Brushes**

### **Types & Uses**

Tool	Best For	How to Use
1001	Dest i oi	11011 10 036

Greyhound Comb	General detangling, fluff checks	Comb from root to tip after brushing
Slicker Brush	Removing tangles, loose undercoat	Use in short strokes, ideal for curly coats
Pin Brush	Daily brushing for long/wavy coats	Use gentle pressure, good for finishing
Rake/Undercoat Comb	Removing dead undercoat in double-coated breeds	Pull gently with the grain of the coat
Rubber Curry Brush	Massaging and shampooing during bath	Use circular motions on wet coat

### **Shopping Tips**

- Look for strong pins and cushioned bases.
- Long pins (1"+) are better for dense or curly coats.
- Soft-grip handles make brushing more comfortable over time.

# **Clippers & Blades**

## **Clipper Types**

- Corded Clippers (e.g. Andis AGC2, Oster A5) Reliable power for full-body clips.
- **Cordless Clippers** (e.g. Wahl KM Cordless) Convenient and quiet, great for sensitive or anxious dogs.
- **Mini Trimmers** For faces, paws, and sanitary areas.

## **Clipper Blades & Lengths**

Blade #	Cut Length (inches)	Common Uses
#3F	1/2"	Puppy cuts, body trims
#5F	1/4"	Short pet trim

#7F	1/8"	Sanitary areas, hot weather
#10	1/16"	Face, pads, belly
#30-40	Less than 1/50"	Surgical prep, under snap-on combs

#### **Snap-on Guard Combs**

These attach over #30 or #40 blades and offer various lengths from 1/8" to 1". Great for pet trims and blending.

## **Usage Tips**

- Always bathe and brush before clipping—dirt dulls blades.
- Oil blades every 10–15 minutes during use.
- Use a #10 or #30 under metal comb attachments.

### **Shopping Tips**

- Rotary motors handle thick coats better.
- CeramicEdge blades run cooler and stay sharp longer.
- Look for quiet, low-vibration models for sensitive dogs.

# **High Velocity Dryers (HV Dryers)**

## What They're For

- Blasting water and loose hair out of the coat quickly.
- Drying double coats efficiently.
- Fluff drying curly coats (used with a brush).

### How to Use

- Always dry in the direction of hair growth.
- Hold the nozzle a few inches from the coat.
- Keep the dryer moving to avoid hot spots.
- Use Happy Hoodies to muffle noise and calm the dog.

### **Shopping Tips**

- 2-motor models are stronger for thick/double coats.
- Variable speed control offers more flexibility.

• Heatless dryers prevent skin damage and reduce matting.

# **Sprays, Powders & Coat Products**

## **Types of Grooming Products**

Detangling Spray	Reduces friction while brushing		
Leave-in Conditioner	Adds moisture and manageability		
Dry Shampoo Powder	Absorbs oil and odor between baths		
Cornstarch	Helps loosen mats, dry wet areas		
Finishing Spray	Adds shine and static control

## **Usage Tips**

- Always use pet-safe, non-toxic formulations.

# **Rubber Bathing Brushes**

#### **Best For**

- Massaging shampoo into the coat.
- Removing loose hair during bath time.

#### How to Use

- Use in circular motions.
- Work into wet coat for a deeper clean.

## **Shopping Tips**

- Choose soft rubber for sensitive skin.
- Look for ergonomic, easy-to-clean designs.

# **Grooming Tables & Restraints**

### Why They're Essential

- Keeps the dog at a safe, comfortable height.
- Offers control during grooming with no back strain.

### **Types of Tables**

- Folding Tables Lightweight and portable.
- **Electric/Hydraulic Tables** Height-adjustable, ideal for professionals.

#### **Accessories**

- Grooming arms and loops.
